We aim to give your children the best start to their school life and we want them to enjoy school and be happy and I think for the most part we get it right.

Now we will move forward and build on these very firm foundations. Thank you to all of you who completed questionnaires and spoke to Inspectors. The Parent View site gives a limited and as Inspectors found out, incorrect view of our school, which was evident when they looked through the returned papers and spoke to parents on the yard. We do our very best to please everyone and we know that sometimes you may not always agree with the answer you hear. Sports, Health and Fitness News

We were finally awarded our <u>GOLD Sports Mark award</u> last week which recognises the great work that goes on to provide top quality, sport, health and fitness education and experiences to the children. So far this term the children have completed football tournaments in Huyton and with Everton, run in the Knowsley cross country races and also competed in our own Inter House Cross Country events. On top of this they have been playing sport on the yard and have received at least 2 hours of PE a week and having Healthy eating lessons—no wonder Miss Harrison looks shattered! A big thankyou to her for her tireless efforts to raise the profile of sport in school—Ofsted were very impressed!

This will all carry on after half term. Hopefully your child has brought their kit home for a wash. Please ensure it comes back in to school on Day 1, all labelled and in a bag. Kit must stay in school. Sometimes we have to re arrange lessons so PE days do change!

New Menus for school meals are available after half term. As it gets colder you may wish your child to have a hot meal. Have a look, the food is delicious. If your child has a packed lunch please consider what you put in the boxes and bags. A lot of food is wasted as they don't eat it (for all sorts of reasons). Events this term
