Your Child at 4 years:

We use age related milestones to help us assess your child's development

What most children can do by this age:

Social/Emotional Milestones:

- Pretends to be something during play (teacher, dog, superhero)
- Asks to play with other children if none are around, like "Can I play with Alex?"
- Comforts other who are hurt or sad like hugging a crying friend
- Avoids danger, like not jumping from tall heights at the playground
- Likes to be a helper
- Changes behaviour based on where they are (library, playground)

Language/Communication Milestones:

- Says sentences with four or more words
- Says some words from a song, story or nursery rhyme
- Talks about at least one thing that happened during their day
- Answers simple questions like "What is a coat for?" or "What is a pencil for?"

Cognitive Milestones (learning, thinking, problem solving):

- Names a few colours of items
- Tells what comes next in a well known story
- Draws a person with three or more body parts

Movement/Physical Development Milestones:

- Catches large ball most of the time
- Serves themselves food or pours water with adult supervision
- Unbuttons some buttons
- Holds crayon or pencil between fingers and thumb (not a fist)

Your Child at 5 years:

We use age related milestones to help us assess your child's development

What most children can do by this age:

Social/Emotional Milestones:

- Follow rules or take turns when playing games
- Sings, dances or acts for you
- Does simple jobs at home like putting their toys away

Language/Communication Milestones:

- Tells a story they heard or made up with at least two events – e.g. a cat was stuck in a tree and a firefighter saved it
- Answers simple questions about a book or story after you read it
- Keeps a conversation going with more than three bath and forth exchanges
- Uses or recognises simple rhymes (ball-tall, bat-cat)

Cognitive Milestones (learning, thinking, problem solving):

- · Counts to 10
- Names some numbers between 1 and 5 when you point to them
- Uses words about time like "yesterday", "tomorrow", "morning" and "night"
- Pays attention for 5-10 minutes on activities
- Writes some letters in their name
- Names some letters that you point to them

Movement/Physical Development Milestones:

- Button some buttons
- Hops on one foot
